Pastor's Annual Report 2025

This last year was filled with milestones of ministry. Thank you for celebrating my "One Thousandth Sermon." I will always cherish the memories of the keiki holding up the balloons!

Also, thank you for celebrating twenty years of my being your pastor. I suppose we could also shyly note that this is my twentieth annual report to the congregation—hoopla, hoopla! I used to have color in my hair and cinched my belt a little tighter, and we got to witness such seasons of life pass together.

In terms of my preaching, I enjoyed sharing the sermon series on the Psalms earlier in the year. In the summer we went on summer vacation with Saint Paul's travels, which I got into with maps and pictures. I have to say that I was inspired by the stumbling blocks and miracles of Paul's travels. I was astonished during this sermon series to see the number of online views on our social media site jump to over 120 views per week. Our online ministry is really growing with over 350 followers now from around the world. It is simply hard to fathom what this means for the future.

Meanwhile back in the real world, I was thrilled to finally see completion of the church steeple re-shingle. This project has been in the "almost ready to go" phase for several years. It started when Mike M. noted to me that the pew he usually sits on in the balcony was wet after a rain, the result of leaks in the steeple. The water had seeped through to the ceiling of the Narthex, causing the paint to peel. The Narthex was repainted by a visiting mission crew from Boise, Idaho. Funds from the Vidinha Charitable Trust were granted for the needed repairs. However, one roofing contractor after another declined the work, saying they did not have the equipment or the laborers. By the grace of God, Mitch Milan right here in Waimea accepted the job—noting that his son who loves to rebuild church steeples would fly in from the mainland to add expertise. Yet, the only mechanical lift on the island that could reach the top was overbooked for more than a year! Just to add to the fun, the proper shingles were not available on-island either. With a leap of faith we ordered the shingles from the mainland and shipped them in. Finally the lift was available. Mitch's son Alex flew standby on the next flight to Kauai, and thus the magic finally happened! I will always remember that fateful phone call from Mitch: "WE got the lift

starting tomorrow, and my son is on the flight here right now.”

Another miracle of sorts was the changing out of the solar water heater at the youth minister’s parsonage. The old water heater’s electrical circuits had fried after some thirty years. Jared and I borrowed David S.’s pick-up truck and bought the last matching solar water heater at Home Depot. The old water heater literally crumbled apart as we moved it out. Jared and I sweated the new copper piping and rewired everything. Now Jared and Mahea are in a lot of hot water!

Yet another maintenance miracle of sorts transpired when the church’s old Dodge Caravan started acting as if it were possessed by the Devil himself. Verily, even the Dodge dealer did not have the parts to effect repairs. Fortunately, rebuilt computer modules were available online, and the body control module was swapped out. This knocked 70k miles off the odometer! The van was resurrected and made youthful again.

Have you noticed that our congregation is also getting younger? New babies are being born, christenings, first communions, even youth Deacon Skyler prepared the communion for the church. Sammi (middle schooler) was our liturgist one Sunday. For the first time, we had one of the youth from the after school gym come to worship with us (Stanley)!

The outreach to the schools continues to be strong with truly inspired and powerful bible clubs at the middle and high schools. These are student-led endeavors, and it has been wonderful to see that leadership blossom this last year. One of our longtime attendees in Bible Club (Kolai) was honored with a Grace Scholarship from the church for \$1,000 for his ongoing college education. For the first time ever, we had all of the teachers from the High School come to the church for training in local history and a pizza lunch! I believe that recent Supreme Court rulings have helped our schools vibe more with the church.

Last year saw the Kauai Association of the United Church of Christ host the Aha Pae Aina gathering for all the churches statewide. At the Friday night “Taste of Kauai” event our church was tasked with providing 400

individual desserts for the attendees: carrot cakes, brownies, blondies, and even apfelstrudel. These delectables you all created, plated, and crated off to Kapaa, stuffing the entire church van minus the driver’s seat. Sweet! Thank you sincerely for undertaking the baking whilst your Friday forsaking!

Also our church hosted the annual Spring Youth camp up at Waineke Cabins. The title was “Alive and Thrive in 2025.” Adult leadership included Jared & Mahea M. from us, Andrea K., Clyde F., Cheri D., and Hannah & Chandler V. from other churches. The youth had an exciting and faith-filled adventure that could never be duplicated—but will be because we do this every year!

On the subject of Waineke, thank you to everyone who came up to the last Waineke work

day! As it was noted aloud to me, “without the Waimea Church there would be no Waineke Cabins!”

Lastly, I just want to lift up the life and spirit of a very special lady who passed unto the Lord this last year, she being Elsie Hegwood. She was the one who folded, labeled, and posted the newsletter for decades, attended every Tuesday morning bible study, every game night, made special “Better than Robert Redford” desserts for potlucks, and nursed not just the body but the souls of so many in her chosen profession. When I think about what it matters to attend a church and be part of the family of God, Elsie’s life shines for me. What a blessing it has been to share the love of the Lord with her spirit! To quote a famous person, “That is all I have to say about that. . .”

Missions

WUCC congregation members also generously participated in Hawaii Conference's giving opportunities: One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS), Neighbors in Need (NIN), Our Churches Wider Mission (OCWM) and the Christmas Fund.
