Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I want to talk about mosquitoes. With all the rain we have had recently, the mosquitoes around us are growing and multiplying. I mentioned recently in the children's talk during worship, the "Mini-Hune Message," that of the ten mosquitoes that left their marks on me only one came back to thank me for their bloody lunch! The scripture that morning was the *Parable of the Ten Lepers*. Only one of the ten lepers came back to bow before Jesus in thanksgiving for the healing grace.

Of course, that was a bit of humor because a mosquito would never come back to thank us for the lunch we just served up for it. Let us face it: mosquitoes are just bloodsuckers. That children's talk actually led to some very deep theological debate on the lanai during aloha hour. Why did God make mosquitoes? What are they good for anyway? Wouldn't the world be a better place without them? Are they actually from God, seeing as how they are not mentioned in Genesis?

All of this intrigue regarding mosquitoes may be applied to other organisms, including the COVID virus we have all suffered with these last three years. One of the prime questions with COVID was "How long does the virus live?" If we can simply outlast the virus, then we can be relatively safe in an infected environment. The little virus only lives for around three days in most cases. A mosquito only lives about two weeks—unless you can slap it first! It seems crazy that something would last only such a short time—a whole lifetime in three to fourteen days! Our beloved chicken population on-island only lives for about four years per generation.

Do mosquitoes get a shot at eternal life in heaven then after only two weeks? Will there be mosquitoes in heaven? Did Jesus die on the Cross for mosquitoes too? Will there be chickens in heaven? Okay, from the Bible we see that chickens and mosquitoes were not created in God's image—a profound clue to the prospects of mosquito redemption.

I like the comment from Saint Paul to the Church in Rome in which we read, "For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be confirmed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. . . .whom he justified he also glorified" (Romans 8:29-30). So, we are part of God's Family and therefore have a shot at redemptive glory as Jesus was resurrected at Easter. I cannot imagine mosquitoes being glorified in this way! Just because a mosquito may carry a bit of my blood, that does not mean it is part of my family!


