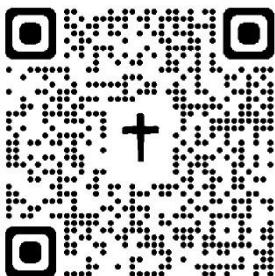

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This last month I took part in an anti-racism class online that is now required for all pastors in our churches. The course was led by a professor from Vancouver Theological Seminary, Canada, who is a native Cree. His main supposition seemed to be that unequal relationships between people are inherently abusive and therefore ungodly. I am more of the mind that most relationships are unequal in one way or another, but they can still be loving and therefore godly.

Truly one of the most godly moments our hearts ever experience is when we realize how lesser we are in our lives to the life of Christ. We bow down before His glory and His grace over our lives. That is why we state that Christ is Lord of our lives, head of the church, and even display the bumper sticker "He>I." This is such a profoundly beautiful sentiment.

Bowing down to another person, showing respect and honor, is critical to our personal faith. That is why at Christmas we are amazed and delighted to witness not just shepherds but also three kings bowing to the infant Jesus. They were wise men indeed, for they understood that someone sent by God was better than they were. All of this takes place while angels are singing in heaven "Glory to God."

Equality in human relations is a considerable goal; however, a humble heart in modest self-estimation might serve the world better. Being a servant to God, and being useful to Christ's ministry, means flipping the world upside down. Jesus said as much in the Beatitudes: "Blessed are the poor. . . " or "How difficult it is for a rich man to enter the Kingdom of God." In this light, a poor child born in a humble stable is exalted as the greatest of all. In this case I am of less worth than the hungry child just surviving in war-torn Gaza.

Our friend Pastor Zoughbi from Bethlehem, who was with us at this time last year, reminded me of all of this recently in conversation. He is reaching out to provide Christmas gifts to two hundred needy children on the West Bank, i.e. Palestine. Our church council responded by sending \$200 from mission funds and spreading the invitation to help to all who read this newsletter. You can donate to this Christmas miracle at the following website: org This is not about some greater justice issue, racial equality or what; this is about loving a child and trying to lead godly lives ourselves. It is about putting a child in Bethlehem first in our world.
