Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The usual humming and buzzing noises in the sanctuary were missing this last month. We all worshiped multiple Sundays without the ceiling fans on because of the cold mornings. Even some of the windows remained closed. One of the noted side effects of this is that the organ actually sounds fuller. Did you notice? Folks were coming to church wearing fashionable double-knit sweaters, too! And real shoes with socks and everything! No mittens or scarves, however.

I recall once facing the risk of freezing to death. I was with high school chums in Germany in winter. We had hiked on cross-country skis into the alps to a small cabin that had been rented for the weekend. We trudged through snow and wilderness for half of a day to reach the small farmhouse. Upon our arrival we were told to "get lost" ("hau ab" in Bavarian dialect) by a drunken group of elders who claimed that they had rented the cabin for that time. As it was already getting dark, the option of getting lost in the snow at night was very real to us.

At that moment, my friend Martin noticed that there was a separate barn behind the farmhouse. We all agreed that this was our only hope of making it through the freezing night. We came into the relative stillness and warmth of the barn to discover there were actually three cows inside. Above the cattle was our utter salvation—a loft filled with hay. We would not have to sleep on the cold mucky floor. As we scurried up the ladder and tucked our bodies under the hay, we at long last felt warm. This was aided by the enormous amount of animal heat emanating from the cattle beneath as well as from a bottle of Himbeergeist that Sabina had brought along.

The next morning, we huddled in the warm hay and breakfasted on bread and jam. Outside, the morning sun reflected off the fresh snow and heated the ambient air nicely. We knocked on the farmhouse door to let the elders know we had survived and were back on our way down the mountain. The elders were more sober but complained that their fire had gone out in the middle of the night and that they were freezing now in the morning. We suggested of course that they should go to the barn to be warm. As the snow was crisp, and the journey downhill, we made it to the cars very easily on our skis.


