The June 2023 Aha Pae Aina took place via Zoom teleconference with Pastor Olaf and Phoebe Liu-Eng representing our congregation. During the Aha Makua business meeting a new fifth conference missional team was instituted: "Innovation and Engagement." An emphasis of this new team will be to raise up new pastors from local congregations to address the severe pastor shortage of the denomination. The vote on the Conference budget became intriguing when an amendment to the budget was moved that would eliminate financial support to the Papa Makua position in the Association of Hawaiian Evangelical Churches. The amendment just barely passed, and so the position was defunded
