Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

When we designed and built the new Sunday school room, church office, and lanai, we also planned for exterior perimeter safety lighting that included flood lamps and even a lighted "Aloha" sign at the entrance to the driveway. This was to provide a warm reception to those who come to evening events at the church; e.g., game night, choir practice, and the Christmas Eve worship. This last month, however, the church received a plea from the Department of Land and Natural Resources of the State of Hawaii to shut it all off. The shearwaters are in fledgling season and our lights could easily confuse the young birds trying to fly for the first time to the ocean.

As many of you may know, I am somewhat of a "safety freak." The first thing I did when I arrived at the church so many years ago was install fire extinguishers! Then, I went to work to replace and upgrade the outside lights of the sanctuary that were non-functioning. Well, you all get the idea. The notion of turning off the safety lighting was a bit of an anathema to me. This just goes against my personal doctrine.

Then "it" happened. The very Sunday after the DLNR notification there was a nene bird on the front lawn of the church. I had never seen one before at the church. It stared at me with its large black eyes, seemingly crying out "save us." Later I turned on the sprinkler in the vegetable garden at the parsonage to see a swarm of elepaios come in to take a drink. I counted ten of them all together darting back and forth. I had never seen ten elepaios in the same place dancing through the water like that. The scene was quite beautiful. Of course, I had to think that this was more than a coincidence. Maybe God was showing me something I had not noticed before?

I took the request from DLNR to extinguish our outside lighting to the Church Council. Everybody was in agreement that we could—at least during fledgling season—lower our lumen signature for the sake of the shearwaters. At night, there would just be now a motion detecting light that would time-out after two minutes at Baird Hall. If we absolutely needed to turn on the perimeter lighting, it would be just for the duration of accessing the building only. The "aloha" sign would go dark, but not the aloha of the church itself!



November's pick is *The Midnight Library* by Matt Haig. The premise of the novel is that



there is an in- between space between life and death called the library (or it was a library in the case of the protagonist, Nora). In this space, a person has a chance to make different choices in his or her life and try out these choices. It is a

chance to find out what happens to those choices that one may have regretted. At the beginning of the novel, Nora has many regrets and feels that she is a failure—no job, no friends, no romance, even her cat is dead. Nora has a chance to learn about what truly brings life satisfaction.
