Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Do you recall the thing that Adam and Eve did right after eating the forbidden fruit in the Garden of Eden? The Bible tells us that they "sewed together" fig leaves to cover themselves. The word here appears elsewhere in the Hebrew Scriptures as "mend"--an idea that is compelling in the biblical sense but is falling out of favor in modern English. We do not mend things anymore even though Ecclesiastes 3 even tells us that "There is a time to mend."

So, the making of loincloths out of fig leaves is a codswallop to be sure. The leaves are frangible, itchy, and will quickly dry to a crumble. Yet, Adam and Eve had nothing more and so had to make do. They had to fix this thing for themselves. Fortunately, God sent them animal skins to wear as a parting gesture of mercy upon them.

Last month while at the organ console Diane pointed out to me that the middle F# key on the "Great" keyboard of our Rodgers organ was no longer producing sound. A microchip on the encoder circuit board was failing. The board needed to be replaced. The church council approved the cost of the replacement board.

After being put on hold by Rodgers Organs again and again, asking for callbacks that never came, and the usual miserable standard of service we have all come to accept nowadays, I was told that the board would be sent to us posthaste. A week later it was still not sent. As I tried to follow up, I would eventually learn that the replacement board no longer exists. Their computer inventory was off. When they had gone to the warehouse itself, the box with the circuit board we needed was not to be found. A recourse was offered: I could buy a whole new organ for some six figure amount. Had this been a sales ruse all along? Are we not always told now to just throw the old thing away and get a new one? Does not even the new item come with three recalls attached already and some proprietary digital encoding making it impossible to ever mend again?

The kaput organ circuit chip can be bought in bulk for thirty-nine cents apiece. The Bible itself says that there is a time to mend. Aleluia! Most everything the church has has been mended: The sound system, radio microphones, video camera, photocopier, church van, plumbing fixtures, x10 lighting system, computer, door handles, windows, and so the list goes on. Mend, mend, mend. My wife Helen has already even re-sewn the organ cover! So, the failing F# key has now been jerry-rigged, macgyvered, or mended with what was on hand in a biblical sense! It is a fig leaf for the Rodgers organ!
